






Comhairle Connacht

TUAIRISC AN RÚNAÍ 2018

In January, Connacht was represented at the AIB All-Ireland Club Championships Semi-Finals by Sarsfields and Athenry from Galway in Senior and Intermediate respectively against the Munster champions. Athenry beat Lismore of Waterford while Sarsfields beat Burgess-Duharra of Tipperary with both teams progressing to the All-Ireland Finals in March.

In February the County Volunteer winners were presented with their awards in Croke Park and the winners were:

Angela Moran – Galway Barbara O'Malley – Mayo Belinda Dooley – Roscommon

The club finals were postponed twice due to the weather which meant the games did not take place in Croke Park. Sarsfields once again contested the Senior Final in a repeat of the 2017 decider against Slaughtneil with the reigning champions from Ulster proving too strong for the girls from Sarsfields. Athenry played the reigning Junior champions Johnstownbridge with the Kildare team winning by two at the end. Both games were played in St. Tiernach's Park.

Connacht hosted Féile na nGael in June with clubs once again showcasing the ethos of Féile in welcoming clubs from every province and forming bonds and friendships. The province had winners and runners-up in numerous divisions.

The Province in co-operation with the Connacht GAA Council organised the Connacht Poc Fada at the Connacht GAA Centre in Ballyhaunis. This proved to be very successful once again with competitors from Galway, Mayo and Roscommon taking part with Fiona Connell from Roscommon taking the Senior title and Maeve Muldoon from Galway winning the Under 16 Poc Fada for the second year running. Maeve represented the province and won the National Final after coming up just short last year. Susan Earner from Eyrecourt in Galway as reigning Senior All-Ireland Champion had automatic qualification for the Finals and completed a two-in-a-row by retaining the cup. Connacht won the Senior Interprovincial competition overcoming Leinster in the Final.

All-Ireland success came to the province at underage level with Galway retaining the Under 16A title making it four-in-a-row for Galway and their Under 16B side also claimed the national title. Mayo lost the Under 16C All-Ireland Final to Carlow after beating Roscommon in the Semi-Final and also won their division at the National Under 14 Blitz.

Roscommon also won their division at the National Under 14 Blitz.

The Connacht Club Cup Finals were held at the end of October and early November with all three winners coming from Galway. Turloughmore won the Rose Nixon Cup, Clarinbridge won the Pat Barrett Cup and Craughwell won the Fr. Vincent Lawless Cup.

Development

Officer Training, Coach Education, Referee Courses and various Workshops were co-ordinated by John Mullins, the Growth and Participation Officer for Connacht at numerous locations in the province. School Development programmes and blitzes at Primary and Post-Primary level were run in counties. Gerry Dolan once again co-ordinated the Under 14 Blitz.

Development squads from all counties participated at the National Under 14 Blitz with Mayo and Roscommon winning titles. The Under 17 Development squad participated in the National Blitz comprising players from the three counties with thanks to Supermacs and Connacht GAA for their sponsorship.

The Council would like to thank Gerry, John and the County Development Officers for promoting the development of Camogie in Connacht.

I would like to thank all my fellow officers for all their help and assistance. County Competitions

The Munster Senior Championship Final was held in the newly developed Páirc Uí Chaoimh on Saturday May 26th where Cork defeated Tipperary. Cork had previous wins over Clare in the Semi-Final and Waterford in the first round. Tipperary reached the decider after overcoming last year's winners Limerick at the Semi-Final stage. Earlier in May, Cork won the Munster Intermediate Championship Final beating Tipperary in Ballyagran. The Cork Senior and Intermediate teams both went on to achieve national success, winning their respective All-Irelands in Croke Park. The Munster Junior Championship Final held in Charleville saw Cork defeat Kerry. This strong Kerry team would go on to reach the Premier Junior Final in September.

Waterford won the Munster Minor Championship for their first win at this grade. In August they defeated Cork in the Final in Fermoy. Cork had won the All-Ireland title earlier in the year. Tipperary defeated Limerick in the Minor Shield Final played on the same evening. This was also the first year the Minor Championship was not a straight knockout; each county had at least two opportunities to progress to the Semi-Finals. Cork won the Munster Under 16A Cup, beating Limerick in the Final while Clare won the Under 16A Shield beating Tipperary. Waterford defeated Cork in the Under 16B competition, in a Final which was level on many occasions and only produced a winner after extra-time was played.

Club Competitions

The Munster Senior Club champions are Inniscarra (Cork) who overcame the challenge of Inagh/Kilnamona (Clare) in November in Cashel. On the same day, as part of a double-header, Gailltír (Waterford) won the Munster Intermediate Club Championship beating Eíre Óg (Cork). The Munster Junior Club champions are Clanmaurice (Kerry) who defeated Crecora (Limerick) in the final played in Newcastle West.

Interprovincial Competitions

Munster competed in the Senior Interprovincial Competition held in Naomh Mearnóg, Dublin in May. They defeated eventual winners Connacht in the round-robin stages but had to settle for a place in the Shield Final where they beat Ulster to finish the day on a winning note.

Munster also had success at the Under 17 grade, winning the inaugural Under 17 Interprovincial Blitz played on the All-Ireland weekend in DCU. After playing all other provinces, the Munster team claimed top honours, defeating Leinster in a close Final.

Munster Camogie would like to thank all the coaches and mentors who were involved with these teams and in particular the players who represented their counties and Munster on the national stage.

School Competitions:

In the Munster Colleges competitions Presentation Thurles beat Coachford College in the Senior A Final. The Senior B Final was won by Ursuline's Waterford who beat Clonakilty and went on to All-Ireland success. Hospital beat St. Anne's Killaloe in the Senior C Final and Loreto Fermoy beat Roscrea in the Senior D Final with both of these winners also going on to national success. The Junior A Final was won by Ursuline's Waterford, the Junior B Final was won by Borrisokane Camogie Club. The Junior C competition was won by St. Mary's Midleton who later added the All-Ireland crown. Roscrea achieved the same double at Junior D level. These were the competitions that began in 2017 which were completed in the spring of 2018.

Development

Teams from Munster counties at Under 14 level played in day-long blitzes around the country from April to September with competitions taking place in Clare, Cork, Limerick, Tipperary and Waterford as well as blitzes further afield including the All-Ireland in Dublin in September. Munster teams were very competitive at these events and this bodes well for these counties in future years. Well done to everyone involved with these groups; coaches, parents, officials and the players themselves.

Thanks to the teachers at both primary and second level for all the work put in coaching teams in their respective schools and organising blitzes and games. Thanks also to Stuart Reid for his work in promoting and developing the game at Club level, managing the Club-School link along with development officer Rob Lotty and organising coaching workshops and provincial blitzes across different age groups which ultimately put more feet on the pitch.

All-Stars Awards

Congratulations to all players who won All-Stars and Soaring Stars Awards while representing Munster counties. These included nine All-Stars Awards and eight Soaring Stars Awards.

Thank you goes out to the Munster GAA Council for their assistance during the year particularly their help in facilitating the hosting of the Munster Senior Championship Final in Páirc Uí Chaoimh. Thank you also to each county GAA County Board and to the many GAA Clubs all around the province who provided their pitches and facilities so

that we could run our games and competitions.

I wish to thank the Camogie Association staff for all their help during 2018 and particularly the secretaries of the six Munster County Camogie Boards for assisting us in the running of the competitions. Ulster Camogie had a mixed year in 2018 with some notable developments and success both on and off the field of play.

Having done the hard work on paper in 2017 for Sport NI requirements it was time in 2018 to deliver on the first year of target achieving, development and reporting necessary to retain the funding. Ulster Camogie Council continue to be faced with major challenges to retain this funding on an annual basis which is now target achieving based. The support of the Clubs and Counties are paramount if we are to retain our funding going forward.

Sport NI - Effective Organisations and **Sporting Clubs**

Two reviews were held in 2018 and a favorable report from Sport NI managers was received. As a result, Ulster Camogie will receive further funding for another year. Much of this is down to the hard work and commitment of the Office Manager Julie O'Neill and assisted by staff of Ulster GAA and Niall Jackman.

Quarterly reviews are a requirement of the funding, so Ulster Camogie must maintain a steady progress on the targets set to meet the requirements. The major target here is 'Club Maith' and the constant monitoring of training and developing opportunities of the volunteers in all fields of the sport.

The continued funding for a full-time Administration Manager and Club Officer has continued to assist Ulster Camogie in rolling out development and training for the volunteers in the many Clubs and Counties. The development of Ulster Camogie continues beyond the pitch as we continue to receive high level ratings for Governance and Culture. This being down to the hard work of all the Council Officers who have brought Ulster Camogie to new heights.

One of the new requirements of the funding is to become self-sufficient and as a result Ulster Camogie must look at other areas for income. One major area is gate income and by being more central with finals and doubling-up the games on the same day this has increased gate income significantly. Ulster Executive make themselves available to attend every game in the calendar of fixtures and encourage and promote the Clubs and Counties involved to increase their support for the fixture.

Integration within Ulster

Ulster Camogie is again thankful to the officers and staff of Ulster GAA for their continued support for the games and development of our sport and volunteers. The strength of integration in Ulster remains high with the continued presence of Ulster Camogie at Ulster Integration meetings and inclusiveness in events and launches.

We have had greater levels of co-operation with Ulster GAA & GAA County Boards and Clubs in regard to securing facilities for our games and we thank Armagh, Antrim, Derry and Tyrone, in particular for hosting high profile Camogie games again in 2018. It is important that we provide the best facilities for our players to showcase their skills.

Our relationship with Ulster Ladies Gaelic Football continues to develop and grow whilst we embark on continued joint initiatives for developing both codes' volunteers to enable us to ensure our female players remain paramount to both codes.

National Competition

Major congratulations to Down on competing in the All-Ireland Intermediate Final against Cork. You gave a great display and were unlucky not to have at the very least got a draw. Ulster Camogie Council looks forward to you being victorious in 2019.

Ulster was well represented on the national stage in both League and Championship. Congrats to all on competing in 2018 and we look forward to Tyrone competing in Division 3 in 2019.

Congratulations to Antrim on winning the Under 18B National Championship title and also to Slaughtneil on retaining the All-Ireland Senior Club title. There was success also for Ulster in the U14 Féile with Division 7 winners St. Enda's of Omagh & Division 5 Winners Crosserlough Cavan. Congrats to all other Ulster Counties on their success in 2018 and hopefully more to celebrate in 2019.

PR & Media

A lot more promotion is needed to showcase our game. Ulster Camogie successfully videoed and live streamed a number of games but much more could be done here. I would like to thank PROs for their contributions and work to promote their own counties, clubs and colleges.

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Education Sectors

Ulster Colleges has again gone through a busy year and credit must go to Ulster Colleges Council for administering the large level of games in a school year. Through support for blitzes and coaching in schools the participation numbers in competitions continues to increase. Throughout the year Ulster Camogie and Ulster Colleges are in regular contact and continue to work hand-in-hand, particularly through social networking. The Regional Development Officers continue to assist Ulster Colleges.

Coaching & Games

Building on the success achieved in the previous year, we continue to deliver coaching courses across the province which require good attendance in order to build on the database of qualified coaches.

The benefits of full-time staff to support volunteers and provide education opportunities will continue to have positive benefits to our game.

Our Coaching & Games Development Committee is eager to support our County Development Officers and we have a very forward-thinking committee led by Siobhán Poulter as Chairperson.

For Camogie in Ulster to reach higher we need to continue to educate our coaches and administrators.

Moving forward

Although 2018 was a mixed bag for Ulster Camogie the talent is present to build and get stronger both on and off the field. Each county must grow and expand on the year before.

To all the officials of our sport both referees, umpires and lines we extend our deepest thanks and congratulation on a job well done. Best wishes for 2019 and I hope you will continue to assist Ulster Camogie. I wish all Provincial, County and Club officers best wishes for 2019.

International Board Reports

Australasia

Gaelic Football & Hurling Association of Australasia

Overall Camogie remains in a viable position in Australasia despite having the smallest player numbers of the four Gaelic Games disciplines played. The two brightest spots of the year were the surge in youth participation and the return of Camogie to the Australasian Championships. Scarcity of trained coaches and referees remains a barrier to the development of greater player numbers at all levels of the sport.

Youth Camogie, Hurling and Football activities have taken place in Melbourne, Perth and Sydney and these events are generally mixed.

The Gaelic Games Junior Academy of Western Australia continues to have a strong presence thanks to the hard work of local parents and volunteers. The Academy once again ran the popular Cúl Camps during school holidays featuring Football, Hurling and Camogie.

The Wild Geese Trophy match - Kilkenny v Galway hurling - was part of a broader event called the Sydney Irish Festival. This included junior hurling and Camogie activities and a public contact booth staffed by the New South Wales GAA. Juniors travelled from Victoria to put on a half-time match; this was a mixed event and provided a landmark opportunity for young Camogie players and hurlers to experience big game atmosphere in a professional sports stadium.

New South Wales remains the strongest Camogie state in Australasia. Player numbers remained at a record high level with five clubs fielding teams. Camogie is played in pre-season competitions starting February which then lead into the league season. Players are then selected for the NSW team to represent the state at the Australasian Championships

Victoria, Queensland and Western Australia each have 2 active Camogie Clubs. Several games are played during a season and then a final. Extra teams are often found for pre-season tournaments, generally January to March, as the numbers (7s and/or 9s) represent a lower bar to putting a side on the park.

Camogie is played mostly on a social basis in Wellington and Canterbury. That said, these matches have seen increased participation over the past year. Unfortunately, there was a lack of competition at both the New Zealand Championships and Feis (the annual 7s tournament in Wellington), which meant that only an exhibition game was played at these events.

Three state representative teams - Victoria, NSW and Queensland - competed at the Australasia Championships for the Camogie trophy in 2018 in Melbourne, Victoria. This was a welcome return for the sport after Camogie was not played at the 2017 Championships. NSW were crowned champions in front of special guests Breandán Ó Caollaí (Ambassador of Ireland to Australia) and Sonia O'Sullivan.

Based on the competing teams from the Australasian Championships, a representative Camogie team has been selected to compete at the World Games in Ireland in 2019. GFHA Australasia will commit resources to support the camogie team along with the other Australasian representative teams.

Middle East GAA

Camogie in the Middle East has gone from strength to strength over the past 4 years. This year we have over 140 registered members.

We have 4 Camogie Clubs in the Middle East; Abu Dhabi, Dubai, Jumeriah Gaels and Sharjah Gaels. This year saw the introduction of a new club called Jumeriah Gaels who have over 25 girls registered in their first year which is fantastic. Dubai, Sharjah and 2 Abu Dhabi teams feature at senior level. The standard at senior level is tremendously high. At the moment all three clubs have come out winners in the last three tournaments. It's all to play for after Christmas with our first tournament of 2019 in Al Ain.

At intermediate level we also have 4 teams: Abu Dhabi, Dubai, Jumeirah Gaels and Sharjah. To date, finals have been closely contested between Abu Dhabi and Jumeriah Gaels. We also ran a very successful Camogie Referee conversion course last October. Well known referee Cathal Egan came from Ireland to deliver this. It was very interesting and he updated us on the many rule differences between Camogie and Hurling.

USGAA

2018 was another year of continued growth for Camogie in USGAA. The numbers are still increasing across the board in terms of the numbers of clubs and the numbers of players. It was pleasing to see our playing base increase by almost 100 players to just short of 500 Registered Players – with 15 clubs now in eight out of 10 USGAA Divisions. Registered players that are American born decreased this year from 81% to around 70% of the 497 Camogie players.

The USGAA Camogie Development Committee, as a partner to the USGAA Hurling Development Committee, once again focused on 3 main areas:

- Leveraging the experience of the Hurling **Development Committee**
- Working with Camogie Clubs and players on defined goals
- Making recommendations on Team Grading for USGAA Finals.


The Greater Chester Valley Sports Complex was the venue for the 2018 USGAA Finals, hosted by the Philadelphia GAA. There were five fields in operation for three full days to host more than 100 teams competing in 19 different competitions. 18 Camogie Clubs competed; 13 of them USGAA, rounded out with three New York and two Canadian teams. Despite a wet and rainy Friday all games were played according to schedule on the first two days, setting the stage for some great finals on Sunday.

Cú Chulainn San Francisco (Western Division) captured the Senior Cup by defeating the New York Liberty Gaels with a lastminute point from 60 yards. Toronto (Canada – non-USGAA) took the Intermediate Camogie Championship. The Coastal Virginia Club (Mid-Atlantic Division) took the Junior Camogie trophy in their first year of competition.

Going forward, the key goals for 2019 and beyond should be for more games through various competitions and local leagues and the upskilling of players, coaches and match officials.

Finally, we would like to thank Camogie Association for their ongoing support and commitment to promoting the games in the US, and particularly for the attendance of Executive Members at our various events. With your support, we look forward to promoting and growing the game of Camogie to new heights in 2019.

Gaelic Games Europe

Achievements since Congress 2018

Belgium were the overall winners of the 2018 European Camogie Championship with 52 matches played over five rounds in Amsterdam, Berlin, Dresden, The Hague and Hamburg.

The Clubs/amalgamations represented this year were: Hamburg, Luxembourg, Germany (Berlin GAA, Darmstadt, Dresden), Holland (Amsterdam, Hague, Eindhoven, Rotterdam), Setanta Berlin, Belgium, Gaels, Switzerland (Zurich, Basel).

There are also active players in Madrid, Düsseldorf and Frankfurt.

For the second year running Europe sent a team to the Tara 7s Tournament in London, winning the Shield Final of the Senior division. Clubs represented were: Madrid, Holland Ladies, Setanta Berlin and Belgium. Europe played Ballybrown (Limerick), Tara Seniors (London), and defeated Croydon (London) in the final. Madrid's Maria Mooney was awarded Shield Player of the Tournament.

The 3rd German Camogie Championships saw Hamburg being crowned German Champions. The Düsseldorf and Frankfurt ladies footballers took up hurleys for the first time and proved to be a strong up-and-coming Camogie team.

We enjoy a good relationship with the Camogie Association, who we thank for their support including assistance with training courses planned for 2019.

Preparations have begun for the World Games 2019, and we have two teams entered. Management is Irene Kirwan (Belgium), Darren Tiernan (Eindhoven) and Sal Harnett (Hamburg) who is also the incoming Camogie Officer.

Teams often travel without a full squad, but captains are always willing to co-operate and to loan players. The most important thing is that people get the opportunity to play games. With ever-increasing player numbers, we should be able to move up to 9-a-side games more often. 2019 will hopefully see more clubs come into the fold as there are Camogie players scattered across Europe.

Gráinne Corry European Camogie Officer International Board Reports

Canadian Gaelic Athletic Association (CGAA)

The development and growth of Camogie in Canada continues in a very positive direction. Each of the three divisions within Canada have established Camogie programmes both at adult and youth level.

The Toronto Division saw the introduction of a second Camogie team in 2018 - Na Piarsaigh Camogie. The club grew in strength and numbers over the course of the playing season with over 30 registered players, six of them Canadian born. The Toronto Camogie Club established in 2011 continued their winning ways in 2018 competing in a number of tournaments in the US and Canada culminating with winning the US GAA Intermediate Camogie Championship in Philadelphia.


In the Eastern division Éire Óg Ottawa Hurling Club have 14 girls playing Camogie at youth level. In addition, they have a schools' programme for girls with two teams in two local secondary schools. Ottawa Gaels have continued their Camogie development at youth level, introducing the skills to their youth footballers and introducing it to a few schools in the Ottawa area. Montreal Shamrocks are seeing the interest in Camogie growing, resulting in the introduction of Camogie for the first time at their annual 9-a-side tournament. Interest in the game at an adult level is growing in Halifax and in Prince Edward Island, the PEI Celts are starting the integration of Camogie into their school youth programmes.

The same enthusiasm for the game is growing in the Western Division. The ISSC Vancouver Club boasts a Camogie team and interest is growing in the other centres of Fraser Valley, Edmonton and Calgary. A successful adult beginner academy was hosted in early 2018 and Camogie is actively being promoted in elementary and secondary schools.

In addition to the games, we saw a number of members qualify as Level 1 Hurling/Camogie coaches, foundation level coaches, Level 1 tutors and qualified referees.


Several CGAA members also had the pleasure to meet with Uachtarán Kathleen Woods in Boston at the CYC games and share the progress being made across Canada.

We then launched into the league where we had 4 divisions running from October to November. Our champions were:

A big achievement for the CCAO was getting the League Finals finished before the Ashbourne weekend, as in previous years these fixtures were unfulfilled.

Féile na nGael Committee

The National Féile na nGael competition is the biggest participation event in Camogie. Féile na nGael 2018 was held on June 8th/9th and 10th in Connacht with Galway, Longford, Mayo, Roscommon and Westmeath hosting Camogie. This was the largest Camogie and Hurling Féile competition to date involving seven Camogie divisions. 110 Camogie Clubs took part in National Féile (56 hosting teams and 56 travelling teams).

The structure as before was as follows; group games on Friday evening and Saturday morning when the host team plays the visiting team. On Saturday afternoon the Cup and Shield Quarter-Finals were played. This led to the Semi-Finals and Finals of the Cup and Shield competitions in all divisions being played at or around the Connacht GAA Centre (Division 1-4) and Athlone GAA (Division 5-7) on the Sunday morning and evening. Camogie finals for (Division 1-4) Cup and Shield took place in the Connacht Centre of Excellence, while the (Division 5-7) finals took place in Athlone GAA.

Over 6,000 hurlers and Camogie players took part over the weekend, with 1,200 mentors supporting them. It was estimated nearly 40,000 people came and viewed the competition throughout the weekend.

Four Regional Féile events also took place. The Regional Féile took place on Saturday June 9th in four various locations around the country. In total 28 teams took part over four divisions. This part of the weekend was solely planned and executed by staff of the Camogie Association. Over the weekend between the National Féile and the Regional Féile Competition, 138 Camogie Clubs participated in games.

This year's competition the Camogie National Skills Competition at Féile na nGael was held on Saturday 23rd June in the National Sports Arena. We had 26 participating counties and unfortunately on the day one player had to withdraw due to injury. Faye Mulrooney (Offaly) won the competition with Áine Leenane (Tipperary) in second and Orlagh Covery (Antrim) in third position.

This was the fourth year of the new structure to Poc Fada with 10 competitors qualifying for the National Competition. A total of six at Senior level (four provincial winners and two invited players) and four at Under 16 level (four provincial winners). We continued to encourage Counties to align with the GAA competitions at County and Provincial level where possible. Many competitions continued the trend of taking place away from the field and to more relative environs applicable to the national competition which is held in the Cooley Mountains on the August Bank Holiday weekend.

Galway's Susan Earner retained her title and set a new course record for the second successive year coming in with only 24 shots. At Under 16 level Maeve Muldoon bucked the trend of goalkeepers dominating this competition as the talented forward saw off her challengers to make it a Galway double.

Hurling Development Committee Report



The focus of the Hurling Development Committee's continues to be on the provision of appropriate games opportunities for players at all levels of the Association. Having regard for this principle the priority areas of the HDC have been on the delivery and review of the Bank of Ireland Celtic Challenge, supporting the establishment of the Táin Óg Under 13 League as well as the development of proposals to increase games opportunities for adult Club players. In addition to this, the HDC was involved in securing UNESCO Intangible Culture Heritage Status for Hurling and Camogie.

The primary focus for the HDC over the period 2018-2021 will be on the establishment and continuation of games programmes, which are structured in a manner that provides players with a meaningful programme of games appropriate to their age and developmental needs. In addition to this, the HDC is active in matters such as the production of the digital sliotar core that is expected to be available for purchase from 2020 as well as ongoing links with the Ash Tree Society, which is a cross-body group responsible for monitoring the threat of Ash dieback.














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
